MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF COUNCIL AUGUST 11, 2021

Board of Council met in regular session on the above date at 7:00 p.m. The followed answered roll call:

MEMBERS: Kruse, Witte, Salzman, Fisher, and Guidugli. Mayor Charlie Cleves presiding.

MOTION: By Guidugli seconded by Kruse to excuse Council Member Hogan. Motion carried.

The Meeting was opened with a prayer and pledge to the flag.

MOTION: By Kruse seconded by Guidugli that the Minutes from Regular Meeting of Council July 14, 2021, are accepted as received. Motion carried.

FOR THE RECORD: Mayor Cleves read a Press Release from the Department of Justice regarding a drug bust. Mayor Cleves presented Officer Michael Brown with a Proclamation for his work in this major drug bust.

FOR THE RECORD: Council Member Fisher reported that the school board met to discuss the upcoming school year.

FOR THE RECORD: Council Member Kruse reported on behalf of Art in the Park, September 11, 2021. Volunteers are needed for loading and unloading items.

FOR THE RECORD: Mayor Cleves reported on the following:

Tiki Night was a success. The next First Friday Event "Dog Days of Summer" will be held on September 3rd. The Second Saturday Concert Series will be August 11, 2021, at Thomas J. Wiethorn Memorial Beach Park, beginning at 7:00 p.m.

Public Hearing for 2021/2022 property tax rate will be held Thursday September 2, 2021, at 6 p.m.

Senior Appreciation Luncheon has been postponed.

The City went out for bids on a new bond to payoff existing bond which has an interest rate of 3.7%. New bids came in as follows: 1.47%, 1.22%, 1.25%, and 1.137 %. The City will save approximately \$170,000.00 with the new rate.

FOR THE RECORD:

Police Chief Estepp reported on the following:

Thank the City for raises this year. Had one Officer in-service training. Been preparing for crowd control for the September 5, 2021, fireworks. Working on updating Police Personnel Policies. Police Department had 578 radio calls in the month of July, which is increase of 100 over previous month.

FOR THE RECORD:

City Administrator Warnock reported for Fire Chief Adkins who is on vacation:

Written report included in the council packet. No report of any new COVID 19 cases within the department. Lieutenant Scott stated there have been squad runs for COVID 19. Administrator Warnock stated there are 66 patients in St. Elizabeth that have COVID 19 and 90% of the patients did not receive a vaccine.

FOR THE RECORD:

Code Enforcement Officer McDaniel reported that his report was included in the council packet. 114 Memorial is in process of removing residents. Duke will be working on 114 Memorial's gas line. 110 Memorial Parkway reported a water main break on the 3rd Floor.

FOR THE RECORD:

Public Services Foreman Mallery stated his report was included in the council packet. Went on a search

for dirt to fill void in the hill at the end of Krogman Alley. Thank you to Newport for providing the dirt.

FOR THE RECORD: City Administrator Warnock reported on the following:

FEMA update for N & S Sherry and Bonnie Leslie will cost 5.7 million dollars and there was 100% participation from the households involved. There 440 days to complete. City Engineer Mike Yeager will be putting the job out for bid. The City would like to thank Larry Dullaghan of 13 N. Sherry Lane and Tom Gerrein of 4 S. Sherry Lane for all their help.

On Krogman Alley between Grandview and Locust there was 2 storm grates and one failed causing a slippage onto house at 535 Taylor Avenue. Sanitation District No. 1 ripped out alley and placed a new pipe and two new storm boxes. City had T Lucky fill the gap with polyurethane. Once the City stabilizes the hill Sanitation District No. 1 will concrete the Krogman Alley

Lincoln Road project is almost done.

FOR THE RECORD: Justin Otto from Campbell County Fiscal Court promoting Campbell County Citizens' Academy. FOR THE RECORD: City Attorney Dave Fessler read Ordinance 2021-07-02 establishing guidelines for special events within the City of Bellevue for the second time.

MOTION: By Kruse seconded by Fisher that Ordinance 2021-07-02 pass the second reading: VOTE: Yes 5 No 0. Motion carried. THE ORDINANCE BECAME LAW.

FOR THE RECORD: City Attorney Dave Fessler read Ordinance 2021-07-03, amending the annual budget for the fiscal year July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022 for the second time.

MOTION: By Guidugli seconded by Kruse that Ordinance 2021-07-03 pass the second reading: VOTE: Yes 5 No 0. Motion carried. THE ORDINANCE BECAME LAW.

FOR THE RECORD: City Attorney Dave Fessler read Order 2021-08-01 Approving an amendment to the Bellevue Entertainment District Rules changing the times and days BED activities are allowed to 9 am to midnight Sunday through Saturday.

MOTION: By Fisher seconded by Kruse that Order 2021-08-01 be adopted as read. Motion carried.

FOR THE RECORD: City Attorney Dave Fessler read Order 2021-08-02, authorizing the issuance of up to \$24,000.000 maximum aggregate principal amount taxable industrial building revenue bonds, and authorizing the issuance of up to \$45,000.000 maximum aggregate principal amount taxable special obligation industrial building revenue bonds.

FOR THE RECORD: Mayor Cleves stated this is not a debt the City of Bellevue is taking on. It is to help the contractor that is building 74 new homes on Covert Run Pike.

MOTION: By Kruse seconded by Guidugli that Order 2021-08-02 be adopted as read. Motion carried.

FOR THE RECORD: City Attorney Dave Fessler read Order 2021-08-03 appointing Jeremy Worley as a member to the City of Bellevue Transit Authority Board.

MOTION: By Fisher seconded by Guidugli that Order 2021-08-03 be adopted as read. Motion carried.

FOR THE RECORD: City Attorney Dave Fessler read Order 2021-08-04 reappointing John Hodges-Batzka as a member to the City of Bellevue Transit Authority board.

MOTION: By Fisher seconded by Guidugli that Order 2021-08-04 be adopted as read. Motion carried.

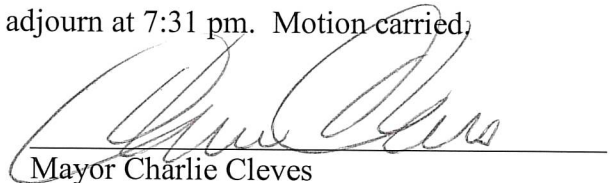
