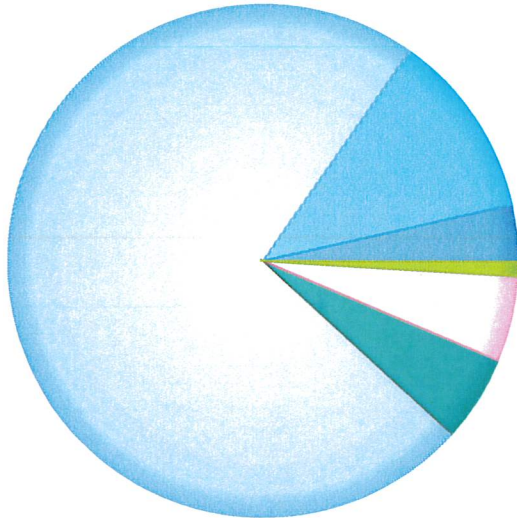

We may need to check your archived emails to see if you have a copy of the email and attachments because I can't access emails sent from when I was with PRIME. Frank and Lindy were both copied on an email I sent on 3/20/24 that included the as built plans. We also need to check agreements with residents to see if there is any language about them being responsible for any maintenance in the future.</p>
DONNERMEYER DRIVE	<p>PRIME is performing a final internal plan review. Updated plans will be sent to City for a final review and to Maggie at KYTC for the final environmental approval. PRIME sent me a plan set that has the disturb limits finalized. I have begun working on getting the consent and release forms signed and have contact information for all the owners.</p>
Covert Run	<p>We only need the consent and release form from 650 Covert Run because 3 cars stack up from the back of the driveway up to the edge of pavement. PRIME is checking to see if the design can be updated to stay off this property all together. Palmer has started on the environmental process and Danny is working on the stormwater component. PRIME to send plans to review ASAP. A new storm inlet will be installed near 611 Covert Run so the owner can tie any private improvements to this if he wants.</p>
Riverfront Commons Multi-Use Path	<p>PRIME is updating the path design. Lochner is going to do the Environmental. I have asked PRIME to provide an estimated timeline on when the plans will be updated and ready for review. We met with the development team on 1/27 with PRIME AE to coordinate the path design with the updated site layout. This includes trying to accommodate the potential need for the ladder truck to access the river side of the development. The development team provided the design files for PRIME to use to help update the layout of the path. <b>We met with SD1 on 5.29.26 and they have a new idea on how to handle the new storm system that will eliminate the need for pump stations. We are working with them to try and accommodate this work.</b></p>

Annual Resurfacing	<p><b>2025 list of streets has been completed other than some striping. The Memorial Day PR campaign generated extensive regional earned media coverage including all four Cincinnati television affiliates, live morning remotes, feature storytelling coverage, digital news placements and community event listings. Estimated earned media value estimated with print and digital media exceeded \$20,000 while significantly increasing regional visibility for the Bellevue-Dayton Memorial Day initiatives and Hero Banner Project.

- I researched local reporters to see if anyone had connections to the military. Adrian Whisnatt from *WCPO Channel 9* served in the Naval Academy. I reached out to him via email, and he covered the banners and the memorial ceremony on Memorial Day.
- *WLWT Channel 5* took footage of the 5k and interviewed Sam Shelton.
- *Local 12* reporter Katie Amrhein covered the Hero Banner project and did a live feed from the morning of the parade.
- *Fox 19* reporter Ken Baker did a live remote the morning of the parade. Beginning at 7:30 am he did a live report from the 5k with Sam Shelton, interviewed Chief McClain about the Hero Banners. I did the remaining live reports since they were during either the memorial services or the parade. We also did two interviews that were taped to play during the evening news.

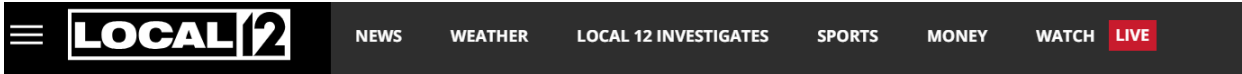

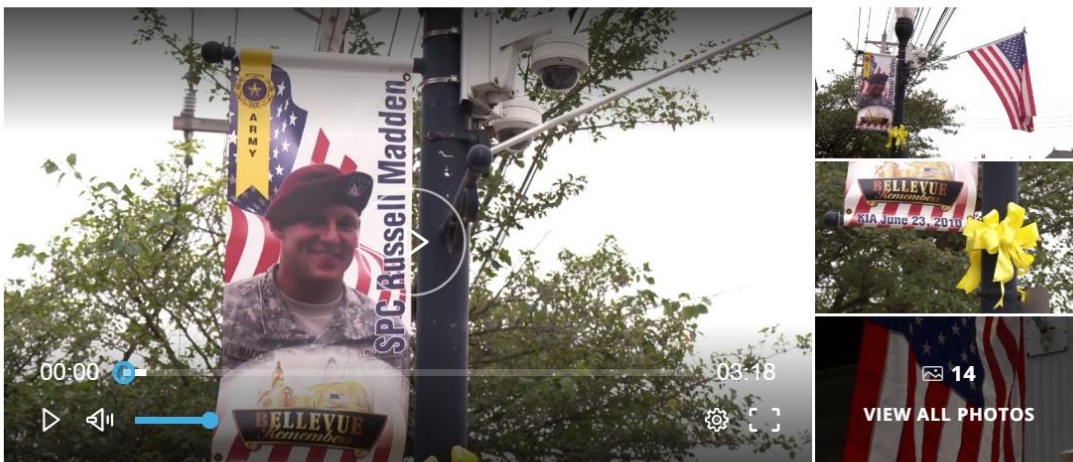

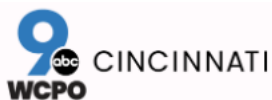

**ORDINANCE 2026-06-02**

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AND UPDATING THE ANNUAL CLASSIFICATION AND COMPENSATION PLAN OF THE CITY OF BELLEVUE.**

**WHEREAS**, the City Council and the Administration of the City of Bellevue recognize that a classification and compensation system which is designed to recruit and retain a quality, motivated workforce is indispensable to effective city government; and

**WHEREAS**, it is essential to have equal-pay-for-equal-work provisions for all city employees; and

**WHEREAS**, the Police Chief has surveyed the salaries of law enforcement personnel in Northern Kentucky, and is recommending a new pay classification scheme for the officers and employees of the Bellevue Police Department; and

**WHEREAS**, KRS 83A.130(1) and (2) the Board of Council shall, by ordinance, set compensation to be paid by all elected and appointed officers and employees of the City; and

**WHEREAS**, court decisions and legislation allow for “cost of living adjustments” for mayors and councilpersons, and cost of living adjustments are not deemed “compensation”, the constitutional and statutory prohibitions against changing compensation during the term of office do not apply to cost-of-living adjustments; therefore, elected city officials may be given cost of living adjustments during their terms in office in accordance with state law; and

**WHEREAS**, in order to provide a basis for cost-of-living adjustments, KRS 83A.075 requires the Department of Local Government to determine annual increases or decreases in the consumer price index and compute the maximum compensation that may be paid to elected city officials; and

**WHEREAS**, KRS 83A.070 provides that the Board of Council shall fix the compensation of city employees in accordance with personnel and pay classification plan that shall be adopted by ordinance, and the City is required to implement a position and salary classification plan for all of its employees; and

**WHEREAS**, the implementation of classification and compensation systems for employees is a common practice for local governments in Kentucky, and considered a best practice; and

**WHEREAS**, the proposed classification and compensation system considers job descriptions, skills, knowledge and responsibilities; and

**WHEREAS**, the classification and compensation system are based on regional and local market data, a survey of similarly situated local governments, and the proposed system is fair and equitable, and reduces inequity in employee groups; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BELLEVUE, KENTUCKY:

Section 1

That Ordinance ~~2024~~2025-06-01 and any amendments thereto are repealed in their entirety and replaced by this ordinance.

Section 2

The classification and compensation plan attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein shall be the plan for administering the classification and compensation functions of the City of Bellevue. The classification and compensation plan may be waived, altered or suspended only by a change of ordinance. The job titles for positions, a position classification system, salary ranges for each position, for employees of the City of Bellevue are hereby established as set out in the attached position classification system. The Board of Council may determine individual position pay and salaries by an order or approval of the annual budget so long as the determined pay and salaries are within the salary ranges for positions established by ordinance.

Section 3

The uniform system for managing personnel matters for all City employees is outlined in the City of Bellevue Employee Handbook, 2018 Edition (Handbook). The Handbook and any amendments to it are incorporated by reference as if fully re-written herein.

Section 4

All agents and employees of the City of Bellevue may, for temporary periods of time on a full-time or part-time basis, and to meet emergency conditions, be assigned by the City Administrator to any department in which they or any of their services may be required, and in addition thereto, shall perform such other duties as may be required by the City Administrator in conformity with general laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky and the ordinances, rules and regulations of the City of Bellevue, Kentucky. The

City Administrator may hire seasonal, intern and part-time employees as may be necessary subject to the approval of the Mayor.

Section 5

Co-op Employees, students, part time/temporary employees shall be paid in the same time-frame basis as all other City employees. All compensation shall be paid at the rate of between \$10.00 to \$15.00 per hour as determined by the City Administrator. These employees are not provided retirement, health or other benefits.

Section 6

The City may pay employees extra compensation in lump sum payments as may be deemed necessary and prudent for actual services rendered. The reasons to make these payments may be to make payments to compensate employees lump sum payments in lieu of increases to base pay that would contribute to the future exposure of liability of future salary and benefits to the City.

Section 7

Any ordinances or parts thereof in conflict herewith are to the extent of such conflict, hereby repealed.

Section 8

That this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force when passed, published and recorded according to law.

**ORDINANCE 2026-06-04**

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE 94.01 OF THE BELLEVUE  
CODE OF ORDINANCES RELATING TO NOISE CONTROL.**

**WHEREAS**, the City of Bellevue has previously adopted a Noise Control Ordinance, 94.01; and

**WHEREAS**, the City of Bellevue has found it necessary for the good of the community, the health and welfare of its residents, and to prevent nuisances caused by noise from the playing of music and/or musical instruments; and

**WHEREAS**, the City of Bellevue wishes to make the Ordinance clearer and more concise, so as to make enforcement thereof more straightforward.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED THAT:**

Chapter 94.01 of the Bellevue Code of Ordinances incorporated by reference is amended as follows:

**94.01 UNUSUAL AND LOUD NOISE PROHIBITED.**

(B) The following acts, among others, are declared to be loud and disturbing noises in violation of this section, but this enumeration shall not be deemed to be exclusive:

(1) The sounding of any horn or signal device on any automobile, motorcycle, bus, or other vehicle, except as a danger signal, so as to create any unreasonably loud or harsh sound, or the sounding of such device for an unreasonable period of time, or the use of any gong or siren upon any vehicle, other than police, fire or other emergency vehicle.

(2) The playing of any radio, phonograph, electronic device, machine, or other musical instrument, singing, shouting and crowd noises in such a manner or with such volume and for such a sustained time, particularly during the hours between 10:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. as to annoy a reasonable person or normal sensitivities or at any time with louder volume than is necessary for convenient hearing for the person or persons who are in the room, vehicle, immediate vicinity, or chamber in which such the sound is being made and who are voluntary listeners thereto. The operation of any such radio, phonograph, electronic device, machine, or other musical instrument, singing, shouting and crowd noises between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. in such a manner as to be plainly audible at a distance of ten (10) feet from the building, structure or vehicle in which it is located; or twenty-five (25) feet from the source of the noise if not located within a building, structure or vehicle shall be prima facie evidence of a violation of this section, ~~and under no circumstances shall any noise created hereunder exceed fifty (50) decibels during said time period.~~ The operation of any such radio, phonograph, electronic device, machine, or other musical instrument at other hours in such a manner as to be

plainly audible at a distance of seventy-five (75) feet from the building, structure or vehicle in which it is located or one hundred fifty (150) feet from the source of the noise if not located within a building, structure or vehicle shall be prima facie evidence of a violation of this section, ~~and under no circumstances shall any noise created as defined herein exceed seventy five (75) decibels.~~

(C) Outdoor live music is allowed, subject to zoning restrictions, if any, ~~and to the sound/decibel limitations of division (B) herein,~~ between noon and 8:00 p.m. Sunday through Thursday, and between noon and 10:00 p.m. on Fridays and Saturdays. Excepted from this provision are school events (e.g. football games, events with permits obtained from the city, the city's summer concert series, and other events as from time to time are permitted by city). No offsite, live music shall be permitted except as specifically permitted by city.

This Ordinance shall become effective upon passage, approval and publication according to law.
